As we begin Advent, we have said our farewells to one liturgical year and with the first Sunday of Advent we turn to Year C in the liturgical calendar and we begin the seasonal cycle once more.

Christmas trees will be coming out of storage and baubles will be dusted and lights checked to see if they are still working. In our churches we are getting our head around physical Christmas services, a far cry from where we were last year. Although we have had to be Covid careful and we must continue to respect one another when in large groups as we know Covid is still very much active and still devastating families.

We reminisce of Christmases past. I know it often takes me ages to decorate our Christmas tree, a 7ft white artificial one which I have had so long now, each year I wonder if it will last one more year. The Christmas carols and songs playing out in the background as hopefully this year the grandchildren may be able to help me. Our tree is over 25 years old, each bauble holds a memory or at least triggers one, especially the handmade ones that our children made when they were small, and in a disposable world our grown up kids always ask, "why have you still got those?" Along with the happy memories we have, these can cause great sadness of loved ones who are no longer with us and for many people the financial impact can make it a hard, difficult time. Some churches will be having memorial services in the coming weeks and months to think about and remember loved ones.

For me as a minister my most favourite service is Christmas Eve Communion. In my time in London, very often I would have had a Christingle in the afternoon and if Christmas Eve was on a Sunday, a morning service too. Then that wait in between till 11 pm when we would head off to take a service for half 11. The atmosphere, the reflection, the quietness and then sharing the first communion of Christmas always left me with emotional tears in my eyes. I would often wonder how I would get all the services done in time, let alone take them, but last year on reflection I missed that busyness.

As we enter this time of Advent let us remember:-

Love – The love of God who gave us his Son, a love that knows no bounds, is there for all to seek. A love we are called to live our lives by.

Joy – "Joy to the world", joy that Christ's birth brings as we reflect, "The Lord has come." The joy in our families of the gatherings not allowed last year.

Peace – "The peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you always." The peace he brings to our lives. May there be peace where there is war and conflict.

Hope – May we enter a new year with Hope, for without Jesus in our lives there is no hope.

Yea, Lord we greet thee, Born this happy morning, Jesus, to thee be glory given: Word of the Father, Now in flesh appearing

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A TIME OF PRAYER

Prayer is where all our planning and thinking should begin.

To enable us to focus on the growth of the kingdom then, we have to begin by taking time to ask God "What is your will for us in this place?" How might we grow and rekindle the spirit in the village of Carlton? 'The Church' is one body in Christ. We are all part of that body even though we may think what we are able to do is of very little significance.

There is a tiny bone in the ankle called the talus bone and it has a microscopic blood vessel that runs through it which feeds the life-giving blood to the foot and ankle. Without that supply the foot dies. There are many other tiny bones in the body in our fingers, toes and ears that without them we would have limited hearing and flexibility in our hands and feet. And so are we all important parts of God's church in Carlton. One part is reliant upon another to enable a fully functional body with Christ at the head.

We are holding a time of prayer on January 6th, Epiphany, to focus on God and his will at Carlton for those who are the Methodist Church here. There will be time for individual prayer, we shall share lunch (please bring your own) and then end with a final time of united prayer as we gather together what God has placed upon our hearts.

This will be a united moment for us all to focus upon our calling and decide what the next steps will be. So in preparation for this day, I urge you all to seriously consider, and ask God in your daily prayers, this question:

"Why are we here in Carlton?"

RECIPE CORNER (Yvonne)



Fudge (A gift for a treat)

397g can of condensed milk.
150g milk (full fat if possible)
450g demerara sugar
115g butter.
Cherries, nuts or chocolate can be added.

Put ingredients in a large pan (preferably nonstick). Melt over a low heat until sugar dissolves. Boil for 10-15 minutes stirring continuously (careful – VERY HOT!). Drop a small amount into a cup of cold water. If it forms a ball, it's ready! Add fruit, nuts or chocolate. Spread into a tray to cool.

Mincemeat and Pear Flan

Make or buy a 23cm / 9" flan case 400g can of pear halves 450g mincemeat

Streusel topping

30g plain flour 20g light soft brown sugar 30g butter Mix flour and sugar, rub in butter until like breadcrumbs. Set aside.

Spread mincemeat into case and spread evenly. Drain pears. Pat dry with kitchen towel. Cut each pear-half lengthways into ¼" slices (keeping slices from each half together). Arrange in circle on mincemeat, fanning slices slightly. Spoon streusel over pears. Bake 15-20 minutes at 180°/Gas 4. Serve warm or cold.

NATIVITY PLAYS



Gervase Phinn, in his books telling of his life as a Schools' Inspector in the Yorkshire Dales, recalls many a story of infant children's nativity plays. Here are parts of a few of them.

As he was walking up the path to a school, to watch a nativity play rehearsal, he met some children apparently on their way home. He told them he was there to see the nativity play, to be told bluntly, "It's off." "It's off?" he asked. "Aye", came the reply, "Virgin Mary's got nits!"



A young boy dressed as a soldier, acting the part of the Little Drummer Boy, was extremely enthusiastic banging the drum. The little girl playing Mary was getting more and more annoyed. As she placed a large pink doll, representing the baby Jesus, into the manger, she turned and shouted, "Will yer shurrup. I'm trying to gerrim off to sleep and you're doin' mi 'ead in."



At the end of the nativity play all the children were gathered on stage in a tableau. The teacher began to play 'Away in a Manger' and Mary rocked the baby Jesus (another large pink doll – but this time one that talked!) It started to cry and ask to be changed. Mary shook it hard to try and stop the noise, without success, and in desperation handed it to Joseph saying, "You 'ave im, I can't shut im up." Joseph shook the doll with such force that the head fell off and bounced down the stage, just as they were singing, "The little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head."



The little boy looked like an angel, dressed in his white costume with silver trim. He peeped through the curtains, looking at the audience, then turned to his friend and said, "If miss thinks I'm being a flipping snowflake again next year, she's got another think coming."

FAMILY LIKENESS

'Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father ...

Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me' ...

One of the many stories surrounding school nativity plays is the one in which the small shepherds, in dressing gowns and tea towels, and leading sheep covered in hearth rugs, stumble onto the stage to kneel around the baby Jesus. The shepherds, encouraged by their teacher in rehearsal to use their own words to act out the story, are quiet for a moment. They shuffled and looked at each other. Then they looked at the baby. One speaks. "Oh! He does look like his dad", he says. A phrase he'd heard his mother say as she admired a neighbour's new baby. The audience smiled, but behind the fun and giggles there was a real truth. Jesus did look like his dad.

His whole life, his words and actions, were meant to show us what God was like. To tell us that God isn't way above the clouds in some divine shopping centre, which is as near to heaven as some of us can imagine, but down here on earth with us, waiting to enter our lives. Looking at Jesus we can learn a lot about love and forgiveness, and a complete commitment to other people. And when we change the looking at to following, he offers us the strength to live more positively and become more 'like his dad'.


