We hope you enjoy this Platinum Jubilee issue, and we welcome our Superintendent Minister, Rev Julie Coates, to write a letter for us.

## Dear Friends

I write this as people around the country are organising ways of celebrating the Platinum Anniversary of the Queen's reign. Trees are being planted, parties organised, lemon trifles created and bunting strung up.

List-making seems very popular. Have you seen the list of 70 noteworthy novels written in the Commonwealth during the last seven decades? It includes 'Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy' by John Le Carré, 'The Remains of the Day' by Kazuo Ishiguro, 'Life of Pi' by Yann Martel and 'Wolf Hall' by Hilary Mantel.

Then there is the list that suggests 70 good deeds, or acts of kindness, that we could each put into practice in the coming days? That includes:

- Think of an everyday item that's in good condition. Find a recipient and give it away.
- Drop a thank you card to a hidden hero, just to let them know they're noticed.
- Spend time drafting an intentional message telling an old friend or teacher about their impact on you.
- Tackle a community clean up that makes a difference – contact your friends and neighbours with some suggested dates and times and see who responds.

I wonder how the Queen herself is preparing for all of the celebrations?

One thing that has come to light recently is that she made very careful (and prayerful) spiritual preparations for her Coronation. These were overseen by the Archbishop of Canterbury who gave her daily meditations, including Bible readings and prayers for her to use in the month leading up to that special day. Many of those

private prayers have been published this year to show how important faith was, and still is, to the Queen.

In one of the first meditations she is directed to Psalm 25 which asks: 'Show me your ways Lord, teach me your paths. Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Saviour, and my hope is in you all day long ...'

The reflection that follows reads: 'The whole of life is a journey to God. In its course are many lesser journeys taken for many different purposes. Sometimes the Bible records special journeys undertaken for special purposes in answer to a call from God ... Such will be my journey to Westminster. It will be undertaken in obedience to a call from God. I have not chosen this office for myself: he has appointed me to it, and I go to be consecrated to it by him. My prayer must echo that of Mary, and that of our Lord himself: 'Be it unto me according to thy will'; 'Not what I will, but what thou wilt' and because he leads I may follow in complete trust.'

Here are a couple of the other prayers which I commend to you

'O Christ, Our God, fill my heart with the joy of faithful service.'

'For myself O Lord and for my peoples I pray, that thou wilt make our minds to be wise, our hearts sound, and our wills righteous, according to thy will and unto thy glory, through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.'

However you celebrate the Jubilee I pray that these words will inspire and encourage you.

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# Wearing of face masks

As Covid infection numbers are dropping, we felt the time was right to look again at our risk assessment regarding wearing masks. On 22<sup>nd</sup> May, the congregation agreed the following.

From now on, if you wish, you will not need to wear a mask to come into the building or for worship. On a Sunday there will be an area set aside for anyone who is vulnerable, and we ask you to please respect this to protect those people. This area will be at the back of the church, and the back section of the tables. Vulnerable people will continue to wear their masks – please keep socially distanced from them.

Covid has **not** gone away, and as we learn to live with it, care is still needed. We will continue with all other precautions – letting in fresh air, using hand sanitiser, washing hands when preparing or serving food, or handling communion elements, and cleaning regularly used surfaces. If you have Covid symptoms we would ask you not to come to church or any group or event.

Some chairs nearest the pulpit have been removed to try and protect any vulnerable preachers.

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## **JUBILEES**

The origins of Jubilees are Biblical. There was a pattern of sevens in the Old Testament, beginning with creation when the seventh day, the Sabbath, was to be a day of rest. The pattern was reflected in festivals, and later was extended to the land. Every seventh year, a Sabbatical year, the land had to lie fallow, and it was a year when people, freed from much of their ordinary work, were taught and trained in God's law. The fiftieth year, following the seventh seven, was the Year of Jubilee. Debts were cancelled, slaves released, and land was returned to its original owners.

Those of you who were in church on Sunday will have heard how the theme continued in the time of Jesus, and how we should continue today to help the poor, the marginalised, the vulnerable, the refugees, and seek for justice.

These days Royal Jubilees celebrate significant milestones in monarchs' reigns. There have been a few Golden, and one Diamond, but the Queen is the first to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee. She is the longest serving female head of state in history, and the longest reigning British monarch.

On the following pages you'll find Royal recipes, stories by people who have seen the Queen, quotes from famous people on what the Queen means to them (taken from the ITV Platinum Jubilee Celebration at the Royal Windsor Horse Show), and quotes from the Queen's speeches, broadcasts and messages when she mentions her Christian faith and what it means to her.

From the 2-5 June Great Britain, the Commonwealth and indeed the world will be celebrating the Queen's remarkable achievement – 70 years of faith and service.

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# **ROYAL RECIPES** (Yvonne)

(including information from Tea fit for a Queen – in association with Historic Palaces)

For breakfast, the Queen has cereal (stored in Tupperware containers) followed by toast and marmalade with Earl Grey tea. Lunch is salmon and vegetables or salad – no dessert. For afternoon tea, the Queen likes cucumber and mint sandwiches. The cucumber is marinated in a bowl with mint, white wine vinegar and olive oil for 10 minutes then laid on buttered bread with the crusts cut off and sliced into 3 fingers. She also likes jam pennies – use a 4-5 cm cutter to cut 3 circles from each slice of white bread. Spread butter over 2 rounds and sandwich together with strawberry or raspberry jam. Victoria sandwich is named after Queen Victoria.

When Princess Elizabeth and Philip married in 1947, the banquet included Filet de Sole Mountbatten, partridge casserole and vegetables, royal salad, bombe glace (ice cream with strawberries from the monarch's greenhouses (in November). The wedding cake was 4 tiers and 9' tall, mostly made from supplies from the Girl Guides of Australia, due to lack of resources and rationing in England.

The Queen's favourite cake is said to be Chocolate Biscuit cake. Prince William loved it so much when he was growing up that he chose it as his Groom's Cake at his wedding.

A lemon and Swiss roll amaretti trifle is to be the official pudding for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee after winning a competition to find a new dessert. It was inspired by the lemon posset served at the Queen's wedding to Prince Philip.

# **RECIPE CORNER** (Yvonne)



# **Coronation Chicken** – originally called Chicken Elizabeth

- 1 tsp curry powder
- 4 tbsp mayonnaise
- 1 tsp crème fraiche

1 ½ tbsp mango chutney 100g roast chicken (shredded) Seasoning

Put curry powder in a pan and heat for a minute or two to release aroma. Tip into bowl and add mayonnaise, crème fraiche, chutney and plenty of seasoning. Stir in chicken. If mix is very thick, stir in 1-2 teaspoons of water. Serve on crusty rolls or with a baked potato.

## **Chocolate Biscuit Cake**

150g unsalted butter (plus extra to grease) 100g golden syrup 300g dark chocolate (min 50% cocoa) chopped 1 tbsp brandy 200g rich tea biscuits

Grease and line 16cm cake tin. Melt butter, syrup and 125g of chocolate in a pan. As soon as melted, add the brandy. Heat for 1 minute, remove from heat. Break the biscuits into bite sized chunks (not too big or small) Stir into the chocolate mix to coat. Spoon into lined tin, leaving no gaps. Chill for 1 hour. Remove from tin and place on rack, over a tray. Melt remaining chocolate over a pan of simmering water. Cool for 10 minutes then spoon over cake to cover. Cool then slice.

# **GLIMPSES OF THE QUEEN (and others)**

When I was younger (much younger), mum and I would stand for hours waiting to see members of the Royal Family when they were visiting the area. We'd be there early to get a spot at the front of the railings, with drinks and snacks to keep us going. Sometimes it was just a glimpse, yards away, other times wonderfully close.

I have memories of travelling to London on the midnight train from Sheffield for the Queen Mother's 80<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations. We were outside Buckingham Palace, near the Victoria Memorial at 5.30 am!!!! so we had the first sightings of the whole of the Royal Family as they left in carriages to go to St Paul's Cathedral for a Service of Thanksgiving. Once they had all gone, we listened to proceedings on a small radio and waited for them all to come back and appear on the balcony.

We saw the Queen four times, once at Doncaster in 1975, in Mansfield in 1977 during her Silver Jubilee tour of the UK, in 1981 when she opened the then new Worksop Town Hall, or Queen's Buildings, and in 1991 when she opened Sheffield Arena.

In Doncaster I remember being quite excited when the car stopped just opposite where we were standing for the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh to get out and begin a walkabout. The first person the Queen spoke to was the person standing to the right of me so I got quite a good photo. It was well before the times of mobile phones and digital cameras etc, and you had to wait until you'd finished the film to see if the photos were any good! These are not brilliantly clear, but shows how close we were.
