Today's Gospel Reading: Luke 10 v 25 – 37

Time to Reflect

This passage from Luke's gospel begins with a question from a lawyer and ends up with a question from Jesus. A lawyer stands up to test Jesus and asks Jesus about how he might inherit eternal life. Jesus asks him what it says in the law and the lawyer tells him that the first two commandments, to love God and to love our neighbour are the two most important ones. Jesus commends him for his

answer and tells him that these are the best two of the commandments to live by. The lawyer though wanted to take this further and asked Jesus, 'Who is my neighbour?' to which Jesus replies by telling him and us, the parable of the Good Samaritan. This now a well known parable about a man being robbed, after which religious people go by on the other side leaving the man there until a Samaritan stops and helps, is one which speaks to us today as we ask the same question, 'Who is my neighbour?'. We live in an interconnected world where our knowledge of one another is increased through travel and digital communications. In today's world our neighbour can be someone we see across the world as well as someone across the street. Jesus knew the complexity of the world but he also knew that at the heart of faith is the love of God and that faith encourages us to respond to people as well as to God. The question that Jesus asks of the lawyer at the end of today's Gospel reading shows that Jesus sees faith as having the potential for changing lives in many different ways. He asks the lawyer, 'Who is a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?'. The lawyer replies, 'The one who showed him mercy'. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise'. Here we see the power of this story which is made more powerful through the intervention of someone who would have been expected *not* to help out because of long standing historical differences. Jesus is showing us through this parable that faith, life and love interact through prayer and practical action which show something of the hope that we find in our world. Perhaps we might revisit how we care for those in need both near to us and across the world, remembering this parable and reflecting too on the Micah challenge, to 'Live justly, love mercy and walk humbly with God'. Here we see that both the Old and New Testaments give us insight into how we might share the way of God through prayer and appropriate practical action in our world today.
