Today's Gospel Reading: Luke 14: 25 - 33

Time to Reflect

Does it puzzle you to read that Jesus told people that they would need to hate their loved ones, if they wanted to follow Him? "Hate" is such an ugly word today, but Jesus' was using it differently. "Large crowds were travelling with [Him]", and He needed to make them understand that changing from a "follower" to a "disciple" involved important, life-changing decisions. The twelve men He chose made that decision (remember Simon Peter, James and John "left their nets and followed Him"). They dedicated themselves to learning to be followers of Jesus, and went on to live out their calling. They didn't abandon their families - we read about Peter's motherin-law later in the Scriptures. They changed

their priorities in life by choosing to put Jesus first. They came to understand that the Son of God in their midst was doing His Father's will, and that their task was to do it with Him, and continue on after His death. No doubt many of the people following Jesus that day did turn back. We will never know. But what we can decide is what we will do. Will we follow our loyalties to our own families and friends first, and follow Jesus afterwards, or will we choose Jesus, and, in serving Him, find that *all these things will be added to us*?

For those living in fear – of war, hunger, fire and floods destroying their homes and crops;

Today's Gospel Reading: Luke 14: 25 - 33 The Cost of Discipleship

Now large crowds were travelling with him; and he turned and said to them, 'Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, saying, "This fellow began to build and was not able to finish." Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.
