Dear Friends

of Edinburgh, the huge G17 plane for one tiny coffin, to the damp dark streets of London, Britain's longest reigning, record-breaking monarch made her way home to Buckingham Palace for the last time. Two vigils by her children, thousands filing passed the coffin at the lying in state, and an incredibly moving vigil by her grandchildren. Personal grief displayed so publically must have been so very difficult.

Finally a day of ceremony and pageantry which this country does so well, to honour her memory and celebrate a life well lived. It was so emotional for everyone present and everyone watching around the world, trying to remember that, most importantly, it was a family funeral which had to be played out in front of millions. The final poignant act of the removal of the trappings of state – the crown, orb and sceptre – reminded one of my friends of the verse from 1 Timothy chapter 6: "For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it."

It is the end of an era, and all we can say, with gratitude, is "well done, good and faithful servant". May she rest in peace, united once more with her beloved husband.





SENSES – SMELL (Yvonne)

At Harvest Festival, the smell of fruit, vegetables and flowers is a heady mix. Anyone selling a house is advised to have baking bread or a coffee percolator on the go to give a welcoming aroma. Smells often invoke memories. Popular smells are vanilla, lemon, fragrant flowers such as roses and lilies of the valley, bacon or fish & chips.

There are 5 million sensors in a human nose – a dog has 350 million! Medical detection dogs can detect minute changes in human body odour 10 minutes before a diabetic is about to hypo. They keep youngsters safe, giving vital time to react. Dogs can be trained to detect cancers and Covid-19. This is similar to detecting drugs, cash, blood or bombs, even when masked with other smells. Teams sniff out illegal wildlife cargo at airports or in containers. Beauty, a wire haired terrier located buried air raid victims during the Blitz and was recognised with numerous awards, including the PDSA Dickin medal for rescuing 63 animals. Dogs are 10,000 times more accurate than humans at detecting drugs and 4 times faster.

RECIPE CORNER (Yvonne)



Hot Dog sausages in bread cobs - with topping - fried onions, mustard, barbecue sauce etc or try

Tomato Chutney

450g tomatoes 110g sour apples – peeled & cored 225g onions – peeled & chopped 110g sugar 1 tsp salt 1tsp ground ginger Good pinch cayenne pepper 300ml wine vinegar Pour boiling water over tomatoes and remove skins. Chop into slices. Put all ingredients into a large pan and boil. Cook for up to an hour, stirring often until thick. Pour into jars and cool.

Still on a dog theme...Sausage Dog Cake

Cover a chocolate swiss roll with chocolate butter icing and make head, legs etc with fondant icing.

Create a wonderful aroma by baking Marmalade Gingerbread

8 oz SR flour
2 level tsp ground ginger
1 level tsp powdered cinnamon
4 oz chunky marmalade
6 oz golden syrup
1 egg
2 tbsp hot water
3 oz margarine
3 oz sultanas
Pinch of salt



Mix flour, salt and spices. Melt margarine and syrup in a pan gently. Add sultanas to dry mix and pour in melted marg & syrup. Add marmalade, beaten egg and water. Mix well until smooth. Pour into tin (about 10" x 6" and 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " deep. Bake for 50-60 minutes at 325°


