Today's Gospel Reading: Luke 17.11-19

Time to Reflect

This is a healing that takes place on the road to Jerusalem, a significant detail which reminds us that Jesus was on the way to his own death on the cross. Luke notes that Jesus was in a village on the border between Samaria and Galilee – an indeterminate place, on the edge but not completely in one region or another. Just like the ten lepers then, who because of their illness were outcasts, outside

the village and separated from friends and family. Regarded as unclean, they were keeping their distance, but called to Jesus for help. Jesus responded, as he often did to people who were on the margins of society.

He sent them to the priests for the official declaration that they were clean, and free from disease. Interestingly, Luke tells us that they were healed, not immediately, but on the way to the temple. Out of the ten lepers, only one remembered to return and thank him. And, Luke says in surprise, he was a Samaritan! It is only this man, who as a Samaritan would be hated and despised by Jews, who thought to give thanks to Jesus, the one who healed him, thereby showing his gratitude to God.

Because he did this, the Samaritan received Jesus' blessing and understood that his faith in Christ had made him well and whole again.

God may not demand our thanks, but he does notice when we remember to thank him! This is a story that reminds us of the inclusivity of God. Jesus reached out to those who were ignored, or overlooked, those excluded from the mainstream of society for differing reasons. Christ's ministry showed that God's love is for all, freely available to everyone who believes in his name.

Lord help us not to take your love for granted but to always be thankful. Amen.

Amen.

Jesus Cleanses Ten Lepers

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!' When he saw them, he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, 'Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' Then he said to him, 'Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well.'
