Today's Gospel Reading: Luke 23.33-43

Time to Reflect

Since the death of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, we are getting used to having a King for the first time in over 70 years. Today is traditionally the celebration of Christ the King. So I invite you to reflect on some aspects of the kingship of Jesus inspired by our reading from St. Luke.

Kings of long ago believed that they ruled by divine right. Jesus our King, as we shall see in a few weeks comes by divine action. He comes not to overcome, but in humility to live among us.

A King has the power to offer gifts and to pardon. In Luke 23.43 Jesus gives to the penitent thief forgiveness and the promise of eternal life. "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise." Jesus our King offers forgiveness and a new start to all who sincerely make the request.

If a nation was defeated in War and their King taken prisoner, he would expect to be punished, very probably by being put to death as a sign of the defeat of his people. Jesus goes to the cross not on behalf of a single nation, but for the sake of the whole world. His death is not a sign of defeat, but a sign of our reconciliation to God.

Earthly Kings are by virtue of their humanity limited to a particular time and place. The Kingship of Jesus is eternal. The first couplet of Ivor Jones' hymn expresses it beautifully, STF 318

Christ, our King before creation,
life, before all life began

As we approach Advent and prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ; remember Christ the King. Our Eternal King. Whose qualities are so different to those of any earthly king. Our King whose exploits, his life, death, resurrection and ascension are as relevant for us as they were for the first Disciples and the early Church.

Take a time to sit quietly

Remembering Christ our King, we pray for people in our world who make decisions that effect the lives of many. The leaders of nations, the United Nations. Grant to them wisdom and discernment in the tasks they perform. We pray for our own King Charles and for the Government, devolved administrations in the UK, and British Crown Dependencies.

We make all our prayers in the name of King Jesus. Amen.

Luke 23 v 33 - 43

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. [[Then Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.']] And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!' The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!' There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, 'Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!' But the other rebuked him, saying, 'Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.' Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' replied, 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.'
