Massive Grant for Footpath

The re-surfacing of the footpath across the Parish Pasture (officially Clarborough Footpath No: 1) has become a real issue. Between 2018 and early 2022 volunteers had, about every 5 months, re-laid a new surface of wood chippings. This was a very environmentally friendly solution to a good surface. However, since 2022 there has been a lack of volunteers to carry out the work, even from amongst those who use the footpath regularly.

The Parish Council has been 'saving-up' a Project Fund over several years to have a hard surfaced footpath laid. This would remove the need to constantly re-lay the surface. More importantly, a hard surface would make the footpath accessible for all – walkers, those with walking difficulties, those using push chairs and those using motability scooters or similar equipment. It would become accessible 24/7 – as the saying goes!

In July 2023 the Parish Council was notified of a new grant funding initiative which was part of the 'Levelling Up' agenda of the Government. Administered by Bassetlaw District Council, this fund was offering grants of up to £50,000 for a wide range of different projects which would benefit a local community. It is called the *Rural England Prosperity Fund* or *REPF*. On behalf of the Parish Council Cllr Paul Willcock completed the Registration of Interest Form in July and was notified in early August that this stage was successful. There followed 5 weeks of hard work in putting together a detailed bid of costings and obtaining quotations from contractors for the work. A 32 page document was submitted, a form plus evidence of need. On 4th October the result of that bidding process was published.

The Clarborough Parish Pasture Footpath bid has received £14,050 from the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. This was, apparently, against many other groups applying from across Bassetlaw. The Parish Council had, as part of the bid process, guaranteed just over £1,500 as Match Funding. This is to be taken from the small 'saved-up' Project Fund. This is the largest Grant the Parish Council has ever received!

The very long period of very wet weather during November and December 2023 made the ground too wet to work but it is hoped that by the time you read this article the work will have been completed. The Parish Council is, of course, delighted that the new footpath can be constructed in order to enable all residents and visitors to have all year access along the footpath. There will also be new signage erected, paid for from the same fund.

Looking after others in our community

Flooding affects whole communities not just individual properties and so at times like this, it's important to look out for others.

If possible, check on elderly or vulnerable relatives, friends and neighbours and help out where possible to ensure they are safe and well.

Flood-hit communities impacted by Storm Henk (2nd Jan – 8th Jan) can now apply for thousands of pounds from the government to help them recover.

The financial support announced today, 6th January 2024. will be available to eligible areas in England that have experienced exceptional localised flooding. Help will be available for:

- 1. Flooded households in eligible affected areas, who can apply for up to £500 cash to help with immediate costs.
- 2. Households and businesses significantly affected, who will be eligible for 100% council tax and business rates relief for at least 3 months.
- 3. Small-to-medium sized businesses in eligible affected areas, who can apply for up to £2,500 from the Business Recovery Grant to help them return quickly to business as usual.
- 4. Eligible flood-hit property owners, who can apply for up to £5,000 to help make their homes and businesses more resilient to future flooding via the Property Flood Resilience Repair Grant Scheme.
- 5. Farmers who have suffered uninsurable damage to their land will be able to apply for grants of up to £25,000 through the Farming Recovery Fund towards repair and reinstatement costs for farmers adversely affected by exceptional flooding.

This support will be made available through a scheme called the Flood Recovery Framework, which is used in exceptional circumstances to support councils and communities following severe flooding. The measures were announced by the Communities Secretary Michael Gove and Environment Secretary Steve Barclay.

45,000 properties have already been protected from the worst impact of Storm Henk thanks to flood defences put in place through previous government funding and quick Environment Agency action on the ground. Environment Agency teams and first responders have been working around the clock to manage the risk of flooding and protect communities by operating flood defences, clearing watercourses and putting up temporary barriers where needed.

I know how difficult flooding is for those affected and we will do all we can do support households, farmers and other businesses as they repair and rebuild. We must pay tribute to the work of Environment Agency teams, first responders, and others.

For those who have sadly been affected,

Nottinghamshire's Property Flood Resilience Repair Grant Scheme will soon be open to help residents protect their property in the future, while our Farming Recovery Fund will support farmers who have suffered damage as they work to put food on our tables.

Support will be available through local councils who will announce further details on eligibility and how to apply.

Bassetlaw District Council and the Environment Agency met in mid-December 2023 to discuss the devastating floods that hit Bassetlaw in October and the need for the funding of future flood mitigation schemes to change.

Editor's note: the following report was published by BDC on 15th December, 2023.

Data provided by the Environment Agency showed that Storm Babet was the wettest three-day period on record in the Midlands, which also led to record river levels across Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, Lincolnshire and Leicestershire.

Bassetlaw District Council and its Leader, Cllr James Naish, had previously called on the Environment Agency to meet with members and officers to discuss scrapped flood alleviation schemes, funding challenges and the mitigation measures that need to be put in place to limit future flooding across the district.

This week, senior regional and national officials from the Environment Agency visited some of the most flood-hit areas of Worksop and Retford to see first-hand the impact of localised flooding. This was followed-up by a meeting between the Council and the Environment Agency's Chief Executive to discuss removing blockers to meaningful investment.

Cllr James Naish said: "We had two productive meetings where we were able to discuss our experiences of historic flooding and visit the areas of Bassetlaw that are frequently flooded. Bassetlaw residents and businesses need to see urgent action and it was good to hear that Environment Agency colleagues, who have done a great job operationally, still want to see alleviation schemes come forwards. They still believe there are schemes that can make a difference."

A total of £11.7m of potential schemes across Bassetlaw were put forward in 2021/22, to be delivered over a fiveyear period, and this was increased to £27m in 2022/23. However, HM Treasury rules mean that this money is not available until full business cases have been submitted, which take into account land and property values versus the cost of providing the scheme. In Bassetlaw's case, due to comparatively low land and property values, the value for money threshold is typically missed – despite frequent flooding and considerable damage being caused to personal and business property.

In June 2021, Bassetlaw was set to receive initial funding for the Retford Beck Flood Mitigation Scheme, which has subsequently been withdrawn despite £250,000 being allocated by Bassetlaw District Council and £170,000 being allocated by Nottinghamshire County Council. Land was also purchased by the District Council in anticipation of approval.

Cllr Naish added: "It is clear the funding formulas and approaches need to change to make large investment schemes viable in Bassetlaw. Bassetlaw houses, businesses and land are worth saving just as much as anywhere else, especially given the frequency with which lives are being disrupted.

"The Environment Agency is ultimately responsible for flood protection schemes on main watercourses like the River Ryton and the River Idle, but the broken funding system means its interventions are currently limited to routine maintenance. We want that to change, and I know Environment Agency staff want to see the same.

"We are increasing our efforts to explain to politicians how the system needs to change to help places like Bassetlaw, and will be working with other councils who are in a similar position to push this up the political agenda. We will also continue to work with Nottinghamshire County Council as the Lead Flood Authority and the Environment Agency to identify short-term measures that can be taken to reduce the known risks and prepare communities as best we can in the event of future flooding.


"I am immensely grateful for the operational response involving the Environment Agency, Councils, Councillors, residents and businesses who have all done a great job, but it is unsustainable, dangerous and unfair for this to remain the only meaningful line of defence for our area."

Covid-19 aged children's brains

Recent neuroscience research in the US has given evidence that girls' brains have experienced more pronounced aging than boys after Covid lockdowns.

This research had looked at how the thickness of the cerebral cortex, the outer layer of the brain and its largest region, had changed through the Covid-19 pandemic.

As the human



brain develops, this outer layer thins and childhood hardships accelerate this process. To research this trend researchers compared brain scans of children and teens taken before and during the pandemic.

Their results showed that teens had accelerated cortical thinning during the pandemic. The results were more dramatic for girls than boys; on average girls had the equivalent of four years of ageing whereas for boys this was just over two years.

Further work remains to be done about this effect, including whether these young people's brains will, in due course, return to normal levels of development.

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
Why is the sky (hopefully!) often blue?

Although light from the Sun looks white to the human eye, this white light is actually made up of a *spectrum* of many different colours. Isaac Newton started to develop ideas about the colours that compose white light in 1665 by passing sunlight through a glass prism (a triangular block of glass) which yielded a rainbow of colours:



Rain drops can do the same as the prism which explains why we see a rainbow when sunlight shines through rain.

You will notice from this diagram above that violet and blue lights are refracted (bent when passing through a transparent material) the most. Human eyes, however, are not very sensitive to violet light so blue is the commonest light that is most refracted.



This *refraction* effect is common to all wave-like effects including sound and water waves but light has much the shortest *wavelength* of these. The *wavelength* any wave is defined as the distance between two successive crests or troughs of the wave and is denoted by the Greek letter lambda (λ).

Visible light colours have wavelenths measured in nanometres (nm) which is a unit of one billionth of a metre (or 10⁻⁹ metre if you've got a maths-head!). Red light's wavelength is about 700nm and blue light's about 400nm.

So what's all this got to do with blue skies? The atmosphere is made up of many different kinds of molecules which all redirect light that hits them in a process called *scattering*. The amount of scattering increases as the wavelength of the light decreases which means blue light is scattered the most which means it is scattered across much of the sky – hence it looks blue. As noted above, this effect is also enhanced because human eyes are more sensitive to detecting blue light rather than violet which is actually scattered even more than blue. This effect also explains why the sky takes on a redder colour near sunset. When the Sun is low in the sky light has to travel through a longer distance through the Earth's atmospher which means more of the blue light is scattered away while the orange and red part of the spectrum are scattered least – hence the sky takes on a redder hue.

2023 was Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance's busiest year in history

Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance has experienced its busiest year on record, responding to 1,771 missions in the last 12 months.

The charity's crews of pilots, doctors and paramedics responded to 541 missions in Nottinghamshire, 1,044 in Lincolnshire and the remaining 181 in the surrounding counties.

Serious medical injuries accounted for 676 missions, followed by 488 road traffic incidents as well as 158 assaults and 50 sporting or leisure related injuries. The majority of patients were between 40 and 60 years of age. Critically ill and injured patients were taken to hospitals including Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre, Hull Royal Infirmary, Sheffield Northern General and Lincoln County Hospital.

Christmas and New Year was particularly busy for the crews. On average LNAA teams respond to 4 missions per day, but over the nine days of the festive period they received 43 emergency calls to attend patients needing a range of life-saving treatments including blood transfusions, anaesthetics, and life-saving drugs. And between Christmas Eve and Boxing Day, whilst families across Lincs and Notts celebrated at home, crews responded to 17 incidents making 2023 the busiest Christmas ever.

CEO, Karen Jobling said "Each year the number of missions we attend increases. Last year we responded to 151 more missions than in 2022, treating critically ill and injured patients across Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire." Our Nottinghamshire critical care car celebrated its 4th birthday in September and since its launch in 2019 has responded to 1,304 missions. A new car arrived in November and soon became a regular sight in Nottingham, taking our doctor/paramedic team swiftly to the scene of incidents. Last year our Notts critical care car responded to 436 calls in the county. As a result of this increase in demand our Notts crew has expanded its presence and now operates every Thursday and Friday from 7am-7pm and Saturday and Sunday 7pm–7am.

Caring for a patient does not stop when the doctors and paramedics transfer them to hospital. LNAA's Aftercare Team continued to grow from strength to strength and the team reached out to 916 patients and/or their families during 2023. From providing support and arranging 58 visits to HQ to being a listening ear, the team helped many patients come to terms with their injuries and cope with the impact of what happened to them.

Karen summed up by adding: "We start a new year with great optimism. 2024 is the 30th anniversary for Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance and we have ambitious plans for the next 12 months so that we can be by the side of more patients. As a charity, we receive no direct government funding for our operations and we rely on the support of every community in Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire for the £10million needed to operate 24 hours of the day,

every day of the year. As demand for our service grows, we know that costs will also increase, and we thank everyone who has supported us in whatever way and enabled us to be by the side of patients, day and night."

Recycle More In 2024



If your New Year's Resolution is to recycle more of your waste in 2024, Bassetlaw District Council have made it easy for you to keep that

promise with their environmentally-friendly and convenient Garden Waste Collection Service.

Collections for 2024 will start from Monday 26th February, so now is the perfect time to sign-up and ensure that you get all of your collections. If you sign-up before the 31st January, you will be able to receive all the collections for the 2024 season.

A subscription to the service costs just £36, and includes fortnightly collections of a 240 litre wheelie bin that can be used for grass cuttings, hedge trimmings, leaves, small branches and twigs, dead plants, weeds and cut flowers. These materials are then recycled, benefitting the environment.

Last year, 13,568 subscriptions were issued, helping the Council to recycle an impressive 4,485 tonnes of garden waste. To put that into perspective, that's around the same weight as four and a half sierra redwoods – some of the largest trees on Earth!

Whether you have used the service before or are a new customer, please sign-up or renew your subscription before 31st January 2024. This is to ensure that you receive your garden waste pack before collections begin and secure the maximum number of collections available for the season.

Council Housing Rents Set to Rise

Rents for homes owned and operated by Bassetlaw District Council will rise in line with

the Government's National Social Rent Policy from 1st April this year.

At a meeting of Cabinet on Tuesday 9th January 2024, Councillors approved a recommendation for a rent increase of 7.7% for 6,551 Council homes from April 2023. The rent increase comes against a backdrop of increased costs of maintenance, labour and materials experienced by the Council over the last 12 months. In addition, the Council is incurring further costs as we work towards meeting the Government's energy efficiency targets for Social Housing, with all properties requiring an EPC C rating by 2035.

The majority of tenants (70%) will be unaffected by rents going up as this will be covered by benefit increases, including Housing Benefit.

The lowest change in rent will be an increase of £4.19 per week for a small property and the highest an increase of £9.04 per week for a large property. This will mean that the average rent for social general needs housing in Bassetlaw will be £89.97 per week or £397.36 per month in 2024/25. In comparison the average monthly private rent in Bassetlaw is £640.40.*

All rent collected by Bassetlaw District Council is reinvested back into its Housing Service and funds Decent

Homes improvements including new kitchens, bathrooms, windows, doors, energy-efficient heating systems and maintaining internal and external communal areas. Last year the Council carried out 17,235 repairs and invested £9million in tenants' homes.

Essential safety measures such as gas and electrical servicing are also funded through rents, whilst meeting the requirements of the Social Housing (Regulation) Act 2023 and the Building Safety Act have significantly driven up costs in relation to fire safety.

Cllr Jonathan Slater, Cabinet Member for Housing, said: "The economic situation over the past two years has continued to mean shortages of labour and materials throughout the country which in turn increased prices, particularly within the construction industry. Unfortunately, the Council is not insulated from inflation and price rises. Rent increases, in line with the Government's National Social Rent Policy are necessary if we are to continue to invest in and maintain our tenants' homes.

"Our rents continue to represent good value for money compared to the private sector and we will continue to invest in our tenants' homes. We will also continue to provide important support services such as our Money Advisor service, Tenancy Sustainment service and our 24hour Tenant Support and Wellbeing Service which helps those seeking advice on financial issues, legal related issues, mental ill health and other health concerns."

Boeing 737 Max 9 near disaster

Readers may have seen the news item about an Alaskan Airlines January 5th flight, in which a "door plug" – a portion of the plane's fuselage the manufacturer can put in place instead of an emergency exit door – detached from the plane and was later discovered in an Oregon backyard! The 'door plug' involved was/is attached from the outside of the fuselage and retained by bolts. At the time of writing investigations are continuing as to whether the retaining bolts had suffered failures or whether manufacturing or servicing faults were to blame.



However, a number of senior US officials – including at least one former FAA* safety inspector – have questioned the basic design. They note that the usual arrangement for such door plugs is to mount them from the inside of the fuselage where their larger-than-opening size means that when the aircraft is pressurised during flight, the plug is pushed more firmly again the fuselage.

Whe Boeing has designed the 737 Max 9's plug to be mounted from the outside of the aircraft is a bit of a mystery, Whatever the reasons, the risk is/was that when the aircraft was pressurised during flight, any weakness in the plugs attachment to the fuselage has the potential to blow the plug away – as happened on January 5th. Fortunately if appears from photos shown after the accident, no passenger was sitting immediately next to the hole that the plug left and also passengers were still wearing their seat belts!

The FAA has grounded all Boeing 737 Max 9's in the United States – some 171 aircraft – but the European Union Aviation Safety Agency (EASA) is following the FAA approach although it doesn't think any European airline uses a Boeing 737 Max 9 of the configuration that the FAA has targeted.

Reducing food waste by grinding bones

Research in Finland has developed ways of grinding fish or chicken bones into a paste that can be added to meat products. The paste so formed is highly nutritious and trials that started in late 2023 have found that most people can't tell the difference between usual fish or chicken products and those containing the ground bones pastes, In fact a proportion of those involved in these trials actually preferred those fish sticks or chicken nuggets containing these bones pastes.

Adoption of these procedures on a large scale have been estimated to boost food production from animals by something like 40% which could have a vast impact on animal use. This would mean needing few animals and lower environmental impacts as well as reduced costs.

This technique could also add calcium to our diets as well as a number of other nutrients not found in muscle ('meat').

Anglian Water Smart Meters

Readers may already be aware that Anglian Water have been round to install Smart Meters in each property's water meter 'hole' outside their property.

A quick check with the installation team confirmed that these Smart Meters are battery powered and, therefore, will need to be serviced at intervals. These meters communicate with 'head office' wirelessly.

How the personal data generated by these Smart Meters is stored by Anglian Water in such a way as to keep it secure is a question your editor has asked but is awaiting a response from them. Clearly, if this data can be hacked by a criminal it can indicated when a property is 'empty' which would help criminals identify homes 'suitable' for burglary. Your Editor has also copied this question to Which? (Consumers' Association) but is, again, awaiting a reply. 

Councils give green light to £4 billion East Midlands devolution deal

Residents across Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Derby and Nottingham will get the chance to vote for the first-ever East Midlands Mayor next May, after councils gave the goahead to devolution for the region.

On Thursday 7th December, Derbyshire County Council, Nottinghamshire County Council, Derby City Council and Nottingham City Council each approved plans to create the East Midlands Combined County Authority (EMCCA), which will come into existence this Spring.

EMCCA is set to bring in around £4 billion of funding for the region, alongside devolved powers for transport, skills and adult education, housing, the environment and economic development.

Barry Lewis, Leader of Derbyshire County Council Leader, said: "Our shared vision is for the 2.2 million people who live and work in the heart of the country to be better connected and more prosperous - addressing years of historically low investment in our region.

"Devolution brings much more control over our own area. Rather than many major decisions being made for us in London, local people would have a say in the region's priorities. This is just the start and more benefits and funding are already starting to flow – such as the Government's recent announcement of £1.5 billion local transport funding for the new East Midlands Mayor.

"The creation of a new mayoral combined county authority will unlock the benefits of the East Midlands devolution deal and bring improved public services and a brighter future for our residents."

Ben Bradley MP, Leader of Nottinghamshire County Council said: "I am proud we have taken this final and definitive step to bring the necessary powers and funds needed to improve the lives of the people of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. Devolved powers will result in better life outcomes for everyone; more investment in skills and jobs, and more control to deliver improved public transport.

"It will give the East Midlands a platform and powers to bring lasting benefits and change lives for generations."

Baggy Shanker, Leader of Derby City Council, said: "I welcome this milestone moment for the city of Derby and the wider region. The East Midlands Combined County Authority is set to bring much-needed investment into our area and is the only way to get any additional funding, after years of austerity.

"The ambition is for our region to – rightfully – be on an equal footing with the likes of Greater Manchester and the West Midlands, so I am encouraging the residents of Derby to have their say on how the devolved powers and funding should be used next May."

David Mellen, Leader of Nottingham City Council, said: "Nottingham has today taken a significant step towards an East Midlands Combined Authority. The extra funding this deal will bring will make a huge difference to the region. People in Nottingham will see real benefits with more investment in jobs, training and housing. It is vital that we continue to work closely with our neighbouring councils on this.

"For too long, Nottingham has not had the investment it needs and deserves, and this deal will start to address this. It also brings significant powers from the Government into the region, giving us more control and allowing us to make better, more local decisions."

Plans for East Midlands devolution are similar to those already in place in other mayoral regions, like the West Midlands and Greater Manchester.

The East Midlands devolution deal, agreed with Government ministers last summer, would see Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Derby and Nottingham benefit from a ± 1.14 billion investment fund. Other areas with devolution deals have been able to make their funding go even further and have greater impact by leveraging significant private sector investment.

A public consultation on East Midlands devolution, carried out between November 2022 and January 2023, showed strong support for the plans among local residents, businesses and community groups.

In October, the Government announced around £1.5 billion in transport funding for the East Midlands Mayor.

Thanks to devolution plans, the East Midlands has also been invited to establish an 'Investment Zone', which will attract £160 million of support over ten years, with tax incentives for businesses that will help boost economic growth right across the region.

It is estimated that the East Midlands Investment Zone will unlock hundreds of millions of pounds in private investment, creating thousands of jobs right across the region.

Government will continue to work with the proposed East Midlands Mayoral County Combined Authority (EMCCA) and other partners to co-develop the plans for the East Midlands Investment Zone, including priority development sites and specific interventions to drive cluster growth, ahead of final confirmation of the plans.

£18 million has already been awarded to the area during devolution negotiations, which is being spent on improving local housing, transport and skills provision.

Further investment for the region would also be provided through annual Whitehall budgets and spending reviews.

All four councils have now agreed to the creation of East Midlands Combined County Authority and the legal regulations around creating this new authority.

The Government will now need take the deal before Parliament, as this is first of a new type of combined authority and it requires new legislation.

If the legislation is passed in the coming weeks it would come into force by March 2024, meaning the EMCCA will officially come into existence.



Is Magma our route to unlimited clean energy?

Recent news of another volcanic eruption in Iceland reminds us that the Earth is remarkably hot below the surface – and not *that* far down either!

Iceland is probably the world's centre for drilling holes into the Earth to extract geothermal energy but now these experts are aiming to go one giant leap further – drilling into one of the Earth's magma chambers.

Magma is a liquid rock that sometimes escapes through cracks in the overlying crust to spew out lava. This most recently happened near the town of Gringavik in southern Iceland just a month or so ago.



Although magma and lava are closely related, they are not the same. A lot of gas is released as magma comes to the surface and the extremely hot rock reacts with the atmosphere which changes it's composition very considerably. However, reading these changes back to the properties of magma as it behaves deep underground in so-called magma chambers is currently scientific guesswork.

The Icelandic research project at Kafla, Iceland Deep Drilling Project, is planning to start in 2026 Krafla is a caldera, part of a greater volcanic system of the same name, located north of Lake Mývatn in North Iceland. It is one of the country's most explosive volcanoes, having done so dozens of times since the country was first settled. Earlier studies by the drilling porject team have revealed a magma chanber 'only' some 2,000 metres below the surface and their forthcoming project aims to drill into this chamber to do fundamental scientific research. This will be essential because to date no one knows how magma chambers are composed or behave. Once a borehole into the magma chamber has been made the plan is to lower a range of scientific instruments into the chamber. An earlier attempt in 2009 resulted in the drill entering the magma chamber but it then 'froze' the magma around it into the volcanic rock obsidian. This solidification is expected in the forthcoming project but instruments are planned to be designed to be left in the magma chamber when the drill withdraws and as they heat up, the obsidian will melt away until the instruments can measure as much as possible about magma's properties and behaviour.

Results from the previous investigations showed the magma has temperatures around 900°C and pressures around 500 times that of the atmosphere! This is where the money is – even geothermal powerplants currently in use generate electricity at around one sixth of the cost of electricity in the UK.

The MyNotts app was launched by Nottinghamshire County Council in January 2020 and allows users to make

the most of its services wherever they are by using their smartphone.

the improvements they have asked for."The new-look app looks fantastic, and I would like to thank those in our customer service centre who have been involved in the development and testing of it, helping to make sure the user experience is better and quicker than ever before.

Truck Art in Pakistan

Your Editor's recent visit to Pakistan for Muslim Charity's 2023 Rickshaw Challenge (see our Winter 2023 issue) was a real eye-opener in many ways but really in-your-face as far as road transport was concerned!

Many readers will probably not be surprised that our experience of driving styles and road structures was very different to what we were used to at home, but what really came as a surprise was the universally dramatic appearance (and sounds) of heavy goods vehicle and also buses and coaches. The following example is worth thousands of words...



The level of artwork – and structural changes – to this truck are typical, particularly the augmented rooftop above the cab designed to increase space for decorations.

We have been told that the vast majority of these heavy vehicle are owner-driver vehicle and many of them are 'home' for their drivers because of the long distances involved in many deliveries. At no point during our 9-day trip did we see a single truck with typical UK company name or logos!

These trucks are also often known locally as *jingle trucks* – a term that some say was coined by American troops during the Afganistan war when they were based in Pakistan although others claim the term goes back to the time of British Colonialism. Although the jingling sound many truck make due to their chains and other such ornaments hanging from the bumpers is probably the origin of the term, the most memorable sound we heard from trucks as well as coaches and buses was the sound of their pressure horns – loud and a real mixture of ring tones; quite interesting to listen to unless it comes from right behind your own vehicle!

To get a feel for these sound, go online and search for *Pakistani Truck Pressure Horns* or similar.

Truck art in Pakistan is a key 'vehicle' (no pun intended!) for truck owners to spread a vast range of messages – political, cultural, artistic...and much more. Because every truck is unique, and there are so many of them, the visual messages that they spread through the community is vast. Truck art holds immense influence on popular culture in the country as it supplies a canvas for phrases to be displayed. This is to create awareness and grab attention for causes such as education, end to slavery, or even as messages to politicians to tackle problems such as poverty in the



country. Through this, the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal of *Reduced Inequalities* is highlighted as it becomes a way of spreading messages to the common man. It also supplies insight into the goal of Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure as truck art provides a medium for the development of the latest ideas in the sphere of art.



Truck art is now a key influencer of the wider design world – everything from bikers' crash helmets through kitchenware right up to fashion show catwalks.

Clarborough might welcome careful drivers...

but how careful are you expected to be after negotiating the pot-holeriddled length of the A620 between Retford and Clarborough?

The science of patching these potholes seems to have escaped whoever is responsible for managing these road repairs. Have you noticed how the slightly larger, much flatter, patches coming from Retford just past the Hop Pole have remained

essentially undamaged for months while those 'lumps' on the way into Retford, just round 'Welham corner', seem to get worse very quickly?

A bit of science suggests that a vehicle hitting one of these 'lumps' will generate quite a force on the lump, initially hitting it forward and then giving a substantial impact downwards on the surface just beyond the lump as it drops. These forces would initially drive forward and then hit downwards, the whole set tending to break the tarmac around and particularly just beyond the lump. Have you noticed how the damage seems to move forward over time?

It seems to me that development of a more sophisticated small 'patching' device would make patches flat to the adjacent 'good' surfaces even when the patch is pretty small. This ought to lead to longer-lasting small repairs until more extensive resurfacing can be costed.
