

Warburtons Community Grants for Projects involving Families in their Communities.

Warburtons Community Grants provides various grants including small grants **up to £400** to support charitable organisations towards broader activities which **improve Health**, **Place or Skills for families in their community**.

Based on their localism approach, their larger community investment funds are processed via their local bakeries and depots. It's worth noting that here is an opportunity for charitable organisations within 15 miles of their depots / bakeries to be invited through a solicited process to apply for larger grants of up to £20K.

There is a bakery in Eastwood in Nottinghamshire, which is within 15 miles of many areas within Nottingham, Nottinghamshire, and Derbyshire. If you've a small project or item of expenditure that could be funded with a grant of up to £400, it might just grab their attention!

The next closing date is 7th February 2024.

BBC Children in Need: Project Costs Funding Stream

BBC Children in Need have several funding programmes open at any one time. **The Project Costs Funding Stream** is currently one of the open grant programmes.

The Project Costs Funding Stream has no application deadline.

The fund's current thematic areas of interest for the Midlands include projects and organisations supporting children and young people who:

- have been affected by domestic abuse,
- children and young people from LGBTQ+ communities,
- · early years services and children, and
- young people from Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Communities.

The Project Costs Funding Stream support the aims and delivery of a specific piece of work. This work will usually be time-limited and based on a defined set of activities.

The Project Costs Funding Stream is for charities and notfor-profit organisations. Applicants to this programme can



apply for **grants for up to three years**. They aim to give quicker decisions for grants of £15,000 or less per year.

The maximum awards are up to £120,000 (or £40,000 per year) however, most grants they make are for much less than this.

Project Costs Funding Stream - BBC Children in Need

BBC Children in Need: The Core Costs Funding Stream

BBC Children in Need's Core Costs funding can be spent on your organisation's central day-to-day operations. These might include:

- Management and administration
- HR and payroll
- General office expenses
- Accountancy and audit
- Communications and outreach
- · Monitoring, evaluation, and learning
- Governance, regulatory, and compliance costs.

This funding stream is for charities and not-for-profit organisations. Applicants to this programme can apply for grants for up to three years. Quicker decisions are made for grants.

They will fund not-for-profit organisations working with children and young people aged 18 or under. They seek to prioritise smaller, local organisations.

Other priorities for this fund are:

- Organisations working in the heart of their communities, particularly in times of crisis.
- Putting children and young people at the centre of everything they do, from design to delivery.
- Addressing challenges faced by children and young people, building their skills and resilience.
- Empowering children and young people and extending their choices in life.
- Keen to keep learning about and developing their work with children and young people.

 Committed to making a difference in children and young people's lives.

Some of the organisations and projects BBC Children in Need doesn't fund are:

- Work that statutory bodies (such as schools or local authorities) have a duty to fund
- Educational institutions, including schools, universities, and pupil referral units. Special schools are the only exception.
- Local government, prisons, or NHS bodies.
- · Capital or building projects.

How much should you apply for?

- Applications for grants of £15,000 or less per year will receive a quicker decision from us, and so will be able to start sooner if successful.
- The Core Grants stream supports organisations for up to three years.
- They will only consider applications for over £15,000 per year from organisations who have registered with the appropriate regulatory body.
- They do not make grants of over £120,000 (or £40,000 per year), and most grants we make are for much less than this.
- If your work directly supports certain groups of especially vulnerable children and young people, you'll be unable to apply for less than £15,001 per year.

There are no deadlines for applications.

Rushcliffe: Further chance for up to £40k for your project from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund!

A further chance for your key project to secure up to £40k from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) opened for applications on Friday November 10.

Projects can cover a broad range of initiatives and examples include:

- Creating and improving local green spaces
- Supporting local arts, cultural, heritage and creative activities
- Boosting local sports facilities, tournaments, teams and leagues
- Projects under this allocation of the UKSPF must be delivered in Rushcliffe and must be able to spend their funding allocation between April 1, 2024 and March 31, 2025.

FarmEco in Screveton was one of 15 projects that received grants in the last round of funding. This particular project helps people develop skills, reduce social isolation and provide quality volunteering sessions to enhance our communities and places.

<u>Broxtowe: Communities and Place Grant Fund – Closing</u> <u>Date 22 January 2024</u>

Broxtowe Borough Council has opened a new £240,000 grant funding pot for community projects in Broxtowe as part of its UK Shared Prosperity Funding.

Grants of £5,000 to £40,000 are available for community projects in the Borough to be delivered in the 2024/25 financial year. Exceptional projects requesting grants of up to £100k will be considered.

Projects should support one of a number of themes including:

- Community Infrastructure, Resilience and Engagement.
- Improvements to Green Space, Active Travel and Energy Saving.
- Enhancement of Culture and Heritage Offer.
- Sports Facilities and Teams.
- Digital Infrastructure for community facilities.

To apply, organisations should email spf@broxtowe.gov.uk with a brief description of their proposed project. Include details of the location, activity and expected costs.

Following a pre-application discussion, organisations with an eligible project will be invited to make a full application

The closing date for applications is 22 January 2024. Successful applicants will be notified on 20 March 2024. Projects should be ready to begin on 2 April 2024 and be completed by 31 March 2025.

New Fund to Help Ukrainian Refugees (Nottinghamshire)

A new funding scheme aimed at voluntary and community groups which are tirelessly helping Ukrainian people settle into the country is due to be launched later this month.

Eligible groups can apply for funds of up to £5000 on a rolling basis, to continue to help provide advice and support including hosting special community events, providing access and translation services and language classes and promoting health and well-being. The total funding pot is 100k.

Notts Local Community Fund - Small Revenue Grants and Capital Funding

Applications for revenue funding are invited from community organisations that have developed effective activities in response to a local need / gap analysis.

Organisations can apply at any time. The maximum award for revenue projects will be £5,000.

- Helps to address local priorities, e.g. improving access to new or existing services such as sports and leisure, protecting the environment, reducing loneliness, improving physical and mental health
- Improves local places and spaces that are important to communities
- Brings people together and involves them in the design and implementation
- Helps to address climate and environmental change and/or minimises any negative impact on the environment.

If you are an activity provider and are interested in providing activities for the Nottinghamshire Holiday Activities and Food programme, you will need to complete an online application. All providers must read the guidance notes on the application portal alongside the Grant Conditions before completing the application, taking note of the assessment framework (which all applications are measured against).

Before starting the application form you will be asked to create an online account with us, or to log in to your account if you already have one.

Providers can bid for individual delivery periods or for all delivery periods at the same time.
